

85%

of people reported that, through their participation in UNP-supported partners and partnerships, they were more capable of reaching their goals.

92%

11 family members and 22 pre-service educators took part in Intro to Family Leadership in Education. Families increased their engagement and self-efficacy around their children's educations. One parent said,



"The class has taken off my blindfold. I now have the tools to advocate for my son, who is autistic." 7 organizations took part in Startups. Orgs partnered with MPA students to research topics like logic models and board development.





LBHS has expanded its work, staff, and visibility this year. LBHS now has five offices, 17 full time staff, works in six cities, and engages 1400 people annually.

14 people from six countries took English courses with ELI and ESLC. Seven students are expected to advance from beginner to intermediate classes in the fall.

Thriving in Place project, with Westside Studio, is tracking and developing solutions to gentrification and housing scarcity on the west side, including a city-wide survey, murals, website, and more.

UNP worked with U of U Health to get a 2

Million Dollar WISE grant from the county. This grant will allow us to launch a workforce development partnership that offers case management and holistic supports for people in UNP, SLCC, UofU, and other pathways to health professions. Kevin Nguyen from the West Valley Resident Committee will be leading the effort.

Partnering with West Valley



UNP & University of Utah Health

The University of Utah has committed to build a large new hospital and community education center in West Valley, which has historically low access to health care. UNP was brought in to take the lead on community engagement, based on its 20 years of experience in Salt Lake City. Together with UHealth, UNP is working to make sure that this exciting new project is led by, and benefits, the local community. In the past year there have been over 100 meetings and events in west valley, focused on building relationships, dialoguing with community, and developing plans for the future. In addition to supporting the hospital project, UNP will be doing what it does best – building partnerships around resident-led priorities across all social determinants of health.

UNP/WV Steering Committee

Every month, upwards of 25 people from West Valley, the University, and other stakeholder groups gather. Each meeting features two presenters, one rooted in the local community and one from an institution, such as the university or the city. Steering committee members use the rest of their time to offer input, ask questions, and help guide the emerging partnership. They have addressed topics including workforce development, the arts, and the architecture of the new hospital, and are making sure that there is accountability



WV Resident Committee 15 resident leaders, from teenagers to elders, representing diverse groups and organizations across the city, make up

the Resident Committee. These leaders are working together to identify goals for themselves and their community and will help ensure that community assets and priorities are centered in all partnership areas. These founding members are already very active in the community, including some who lead grassroots organizations such as Comunidad Materna en Utah and Healthy West Valley.
